High School Integrated Math 1

This course provides a comprehensive introduction to foundational mathematical concepts, integrating algebraic, geometric, and statistical applications. Students will explore key topics such as equations, inequalities, and functions, fostering a deep understanding of mathematical relationships and their real-world applications. In the geometric component, learners will engage with definitions, constructions, theorems, and proofs, focusing on similarity, transformations, and congruence of geometric figures. Emphasis will be placed on developing critical thinking and problem-solving skills through collaborative and individual projects. This course is designed to support students in their progress toward earning a high school diploma or its equivalent, preparing them for more advanced mathematical studies. Students will leave the course equipped with essential skills and knowledge necessary for success in future academic pursuits and everyday life.

AED CR2 0.0 UNITS

HS Integrated Math 2 Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture

Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

This course offers a comprehensive exploration of algebraic, geometric, and statistical concepts essential for success in high school mathematics and beyond. Students will engage with topics including the properties and applications of triangles and quadrilaterals, similarity and trigonometry, as well as the study of circles, surface area, and volume.

AED CR3 0.0 UNITS

High School Biology Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture

Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

This foundational course in Basic Life Science provides students with a comprehensive understanding of the diversity of life, examining organisms from microscopic to macroscopic scales. Students will explore the intricate relationships between structure and function, gaining insights into how these concepts apply to various living systems. The course delves into the chemistry of life processes, highlighting the essential roles that molecules play in cellular functions. Emphasizing cells as the basic units of life, students will investigate cell structure, function, and processes. Additionally, the course addresses the interdependence of organisms in nature, focusing on ecosystems and the intricate relationships that sustain life. Key topics include information and heredity, introducing students to the principles of genetics and the mechanisms of inheritance. Students will also engage with evolutionary theories, exploring the evidence and processes that drive the diversity of life over time. Finally, the concept of homeostasis will be examined, emphasizing how living organisms maintain stability in their internal environments despite external changes. This course supports progress toward a high school diploma or equivalent, fostering a deeper appreciation for the complexities of life and the interconnections that define our natural world.

AED CR4 0.0 UNITS

High School Chemistry Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

This class will cover high school-level chemistry. It supports progress toward a high school diploma and may be used for credit recovery. The course will cover the nature of matter and its transformations, chemical bonds and stoichiometry, properties of gases, acids and bases, organic and inorganic compounds, and chemical systems such as solutions, reactions, and nuclear processes.

AED CR5 0.0 UNITS

High School Spanish 2 Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

This is a second-year Spanish course that includes culture, listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The emphasis is on the skills needed to communicate in a variety of modes with increased complexity and proficiency. It supports progress toward a high school diploma or equivalent.

AED CR6 0.0 UNITS

High School Art and Creative Expression

Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

This dynamic course invites students to explore the multifaceted world of art and design, focusing on artistic perception, creative expression, and the historical and cultural contexts that shape artistic movements. Students will engage in a hands-on experience, utilizing a variety of media and techniques in design and drawing to create original works of art. Through a combination of practical projects and theoretical discussions, learners will develop their aesthetic valuing skills, examining different art forms and their relationships to culture and society. The curriculum will also cover the applications of art in various industries, including an exploration of careers in art and design, helping students understand the pathways available in this vibrant field. High School English 1 Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

Emphasis will be placed on concept development, grammar, and writing mechanics, ensuring that students are equipped to express their insights in a polished and coherent manner. By the end of the course, students will have cultivated the analytical skills necessary to evaluate literature critically, as well as the writing proficiency required for clear and persuasive communication. This course supports progress toward a high school diploma or equivalent, empowering students to become thoughtful readers and skilled writers.

AED CR8 0.0 UNITS

High School Spanish 1 Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

This first-year Spanish language course is designed for high school students at Cerritos College to develop foundational communication skills in Spanish. Students will learn to express themselves and discuss their immediate environment using simple sentences, phrases, and essential verb forms. The course emphasizes both writing and speaking, providing opportunities for students to practice their language skills in a supportive environment. In addition to language acquisition, students will explore cultural connections related to the geography and customs of Spanish-speaking countries. Through engaging activities and discussions, learners will gain a deeper understanding of the diverse cultures within the Spanish-speaking world. This course supports students' progress toward earning a high school diploma or equivalent, equipping them with essential language skills and cultural insights that enhance their academic and personal growth.

High School English 2Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture
Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

This literature course invites students to deepen their understanding of a wide range of genres and themes while enhancing critical reading and analytical skills. AED CR10 0.0 UNITS

High School English 3 Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

This course explores American literature through the lens of historical context, examining how social, political, and intellectual trends have shaped literary expression across significant time periods in American history. Students will engage with texts from the Pre-Colonial Era, the American Revolution, the New England Renaissance, the era of Slavery and the Civil War, the Frontier Era, the Harlem Renaissance, and the Modern Era. Through close reading and analysis of diverse literary works, students will gain insights into how authors reflect and respond to the cultural and historical landscapes of their times. The course emphasizes the interconnectedness of literature and history, encouraging students to consider how themes of identity, freedom, conflict, and innovation are woven into the fabric of American literature. In addition to literary analysis, the course aims to develop students' writing and critical thinking skills. Students will practice articulating their ideas through essays and discussions, enhancing their ability to analyze texts critically and communicate effectively. High School U.S. History Class Hours: 5.0 Lecture Total Contact Hours: 90 Lecture

AED CR12 High School World History

The course will introduce statistical concepts, series and sequences, and the complex number system. A significant focus will also be placed on trigonometric functions, equipping students with the skills necessary to solve problems involving angles and triangles. Throughout the course, students will develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills, preparing them for more advanced mathematical studies. This course supports progress toward a high school diploma or equivalent, ensuring students are well-prepared for future academic challenges in mathematics and related fields.
